The Tasmanian Training Awards are held annually and celebrate excellence in vocational education and training in Tasmania, recognising the individuals, employers, businesses and industries, trainers, and training providers who have achieved incredible successes in the past year.

Individual categories

The **Apprentice of the Year Award** is presented to an individual who is undertaking an Apprenticeship and has been outstanding in all aspects of their trade.

The **Trainee of the Year Award** is presented to an individual who is undertaking a Traineeship and has been outstanding in all aspects of their training.

The **Vocational Student of the Year Award** recognises an outstanding student's achievements in a course of study leading to a nationally recognised qualification.

The Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander Student of the Year Award recognises the achievement of a student who is undertaking an apprenticeship, traineeship or a course of study leading to a national qualification, and who has been outstanding in all aspects of their training and demonstrates the relevance of lifelong learning for themselves and their community.

The **School-based Apprentice or Trainee award** is presented to a student who is undertaking a Certificate II or above qualification as a School-based Apprentice or Trainee. The award recognises the student's commitment to their formal studies at school, and in the workplace.

The VET in Schools Student of the Year Award is open to full-time year 10, 11 or 12 school students undertaking an accredited vocational education and training (VET) course that has a vocational placement component. The Award recognises the student's commitment to their formal studies and their VET course.

The **Equity Vocational Student of the Year Award** will be presented to a vocational student who has overcome significant barriers or disadvantage to complete their vocational education and training course.

The **Equity Apprentice/Trainee of the Year Award** will be presented to an Apprentice or Trainee who has overcome significant barriers or disadvantage to undertake their qualification.

The VET Teacher/Trainer of the Year Award recognises innovation and excellence by a vocational education and training (VET) teacher/trainer providing nationally recognised training to students at a registered training organisation (RTO), or in partnership with an RTO.





TasTAFE

New Bridgewater Bridge Project Pre-employment Program TasTAFE, McConnell Dowell, Keystone Tasmania and Lifeline Tasmania have collaborated to help create a skilled workforce for the New Bridgewater Bridge Project. The Australian and Tasmanian Government funded project is the largest ever Tasmanian transport infrastructure project. A key component is a pre-cast yard facility in Bridgewater which will produce over 1000 segments for the bridge, requiring more than 90 new workers. Recognising this need, project partners collaborated to put together the New Bridgewater Bridge Project Pre-Employment Program. The program was tailored to the needs of the bridge project, increasing the skills of the local workforce and creating future employment pathways. McConnell Dowell and TasTAFE collaborated to create bespoke training for people in the Bridgewater region. Lifeline Tasmania provided mental health and financial management sessions for program participants. The project was fully funded by Keystone Tasmania, aligning with its commitment to supporting local people facing barriers to employment.

Hazell Bros

Pioneering Excellence: Revolutionising Verification of Competency Training for Verifiers of Operational and Contractor Staff

In the civil construction industry, a key challenge is ensuring plant and machinery operators have the necessary skills to operate plant and machinery items.

In 2021 Hazell Bros and Swinburne University of Technology collaborated to develop a program for the industry to upskill personnel to verify the competency of plant and equipment operators. Verifiers play a critical role in ensuring that employees and contractors who operate plant and machinery have the necessary skills to do so safely and effectively to produce quality results and minimise rework. This program ensured Hazell Bros had confidence in its workforce to carry out their work safely, efficiently, and with quality outcomes. A fantastic outcome when Government, Industry and Universities come together with a common goal to address a skills gap and industry wide need.

Civil Contractors Federation of Tasmania

The High Vis Army Program – building the workforce to Build Tasmania

The High Vis Army is a collaboration between members of the building and construction industry peak bodies, training providers, and the Tasmanian government. The collaboration parties are: the Civil Contractors Federation Tasmania, Master Builders Tasmania, Housing Industry Association Tasmania with supporting partners Keystone Tasmania and TasTAFE. The purpose of the High Vis Army is to support a collaborative approach to the growth and productivity of the building and construction workforce in Tasmania and deliver the outcomes put into shared focus by the 2021 PESRAC report and the Tasmanian Building & Construction Workforce Action Plan 2021.

T St Joseph Affordable Homes

Building homes for today and foundations for the future in partnership with Build Up Tassie and Centacare Evolve Housing. Collaboration is at the heart of St Joseph Affordable Homes. The building and construction social enterprise has a dual purpose; to provide substantial and sustainable employment opportunities for young and vulnerable Tasmanians, and to alleviate housing stress and homelessness. St Joseph Affordable Homes' key partnership with Centacare Evolve Housing's pre-employment program, Build Up Tassie, is crucial to achieving this purpose. Furthermore, strong relationships with external contractors and stakeholders gives the organisation the unique opportunity to provide a holistic person-centred approach to their blended inhouse and hosted apprenticeship program, their trainees, and their qualified trades.

Industry Training Hub - Burnie

Funded by the Australian Government Department of Employment and Workplace Relations (DEWR), Industry Training Hub – Burnie was a pilot project delivered across NW Tasmania. At the heart of the project was collaboration from industry, employers, schools RTO's and service providers. The focus of this collaboration was to enable career awareness and access to contemporary VET pathways for secondary students in the region. Through the steering group – represented by TMEC and TasTAFE, innovation and collaboration was achieved through meaningful engagement, a high value placed on ideas and an appetite to develop and test new models of career awareness and program offerings for young people.

The project collaboration led to the development of VET offerings that had previously not existed in Tasmania such as mining skill sets, combustion to electric vehicle conversion, live streaming of VET pathways to students in schools and a host of other innovative offerings.

TasTAFE

Agriculture Learning Resources Technology Project The purpose of the Agriculture Learning Resources Technology Project was to design and develop agricultural training resources to support online delivery, improved access, flexibility, and selfpaced learning opportunities for workers in the agriculture industry at TasTAFE. TasTAFE's education design team and agriculture, forestry and land management teachers partnered with twenty-four agriculture industry stakeholders to develop a flexible learning model for the Diploma of Agriculture and Diploma of Agribusiness Management. Industry was central to the resource development, assisting in filming videos, designing and developing farm plans, providing industry resources, and the creation of a simulated farm. The agricultural industry directly shaped the training through up-front co-design, continued involvement at all stages and mentoring participants. The collaboration fosters emerging leaders and ensures the Tasmanian agriculture industry's ongoing success and innovation. The new training model keeps TasTAFE learners closely connected to the Tasmanian industry and their workplace - the farm.
